
Suggested Itinerary for Weymouth:



Saturday:

0900 – Boat trip from the Harbour to Portland Harbour taking in the Jurassic Coast (1 ½ Hours).







Located at the entrance to Weymouth Harbour the Fort is a labyrinth of underground passageways and outdoor areas with stunning views of the Jurassic Coast. Constructed on three levels, that are easily accessed by means of a lift, the Fort is filled with displays, mammoth guns and cinema areas that chart the history of this large and magnificent Victorian structure. Nothe Fort is now one of Weymouth's major attractions.

1330 – Visit, by car, to Lulworth Cove – approx 15 miles. Hint: Photo of the Castle Inn, Lulworth, included!





1600 – A Stroll around Weymouth before getting ready for the evening Parade in the bar at 1800 hrs.

<u>Sunday – for those remaining:</u>

1000 – Visit to the Sea life Centre Weymouth.



1300 – Visit, by car, to Dorchester (8 miles)

The county town of Dorchester has much to offer the visitor, with its bustling shopping precincts, elegant 18th century houses and vital cultural life. Dorchester's history can be traced back to the Iron Age at Maiden Castle, when the Romans captured the site; they founded the town of Dorchester. Further evidence of Roman occupation can be found south of the town at Maumbury Rings, where the Romans built an amphitheatre capable of seating 10,000 people. It was in Dorchester in 1685, Judge Jeffreys presided over the Bloody Assize, following Monmouth's defeat at Sedgemoor. In 1834, six agricultural workers now known as the Tolpuddle martyrs, were transported from Dorchester to Australia for their part in forming a trade union. Today you can visit the Tolpuddle Martyrs Museum, which features a new multi-media interpretation, of their story.
