Thursday:

Rose & Myself were first to arrive at the Hotel. The Hotel was undergoing refurbishment work as a result of a flood 2 years ago, along with the decision to re-brand it into a Gastro Pub (The Kingfisher) with accommodation. This meant we dined in a Conference suite as the Restaurant and Bar area was still undergoing extensive refurbishment work.

Soon after we arrival, everyone else appeared – apart from Chris & Yo Hok Sim, who arrived the next day.

We assembled in the Reception Foyer, ordering drinks naturally. Before leaving the Village, we visited the nearby Church and sighted the RAF Cardington Ensign that had been laid up when the Station closed, along with a memorial to the R101 Cardington Airship disaster.

After returning to the Hotel, we sat by the river (The Great Ouse), which runs behind the Hotel, before readying ourselves for the evening meal.

The evening meal saw us all sitting together as a group and the talk was of medical operations we had endured, along with past reunions. After returning to the Hotel for a nightcap, it would be lights out - once again, early - at 2330 hrs.

Saturday:

We left after breakfast for RAF Henlow to visit the Signals Museum, now housed in the former RC Church. It was strange to see Civilian guards looking after the Guard Room and main gate – I recall my time there, when having to undertake the duties of Orderly Sergeant in that Guard Room. The Museum had many interesting exhibits, mainly donated by former RAF Locking's Museum when it closed in 1999. RAF Henlow has been under threat of closure (more housing?) for a while, with the latest date as 2025. The future of the Signals Museum is undetermined, Cosford was mentioned as an option! The voluntary Museum Staff, all RAF Vets, are doing an outstanding job in keeping the Signals heritage alive.

On the way back we called in at one pub recommended by Chris from 'back in his day', but we did not receive the welcome expected as it had now morphed into a upmarket Restaurant. We found our way back to the King's Arms in Cardington, taking the opportunity to book the group evening meal for Sunday night, before turning to our Hotel, slightly merrier!

The evening meal saw us keeping the tradition of making it formal with DJs and the ladies dressed elegantly. We made a toast to absent friends. As it was Carol and Des Haines Anniversary we made a special effort in ensuring it was celebrated by providing 2 bottles of Champagne and presenting them with a 24 hour MOD Combat Ration Pack.

Sunday:

We made the decision to visit Wardown House close to Luton. The home, once used as a military hospital in WW2, is the former home of the Scargill family (not Arthur!) and now a museum and gallery. Part of the house is dedicated to the Bedfordshire & Hertfordshire Regiment Museum with many fine exhibits. Before departing, we made use of the Cafe housed in the fine Victorian dining room.

Following on, we made a detour to Henlow village to visit an old haunt (The Crown) of Des Haines, enjoying a couple of drinks before making our way back to the Hotel.

The evening saw us dining together once again at the Kings Arms, Cardington Village. We reflected on those at former RAF Cardington perhaps struggling back to the camp on a Sunday night after a 48 hr Pass.

On returning to the Hotel, it was a brief nightcap before lights out before midnight.
